A Year of Highs and Lows

The year gone by will be remembered for many significant achievements by our club and club members both on and off the field, but also for the fact of not reaching the county final for only the third time in the past decade. That in itself is a yardstick of how we measure ourselves and how over the past decade or more we have come to expect only the highest accolades for our efforts. Seven county finals with five wins in ten years is not a bad record, but each year is judged on its own merits and in that respect we can only say with regard to 2015 "could have done better". At this stage of the year we all have to take stock, members, officials and players alike, to agree what we can improve upon before we move on to 2016. Like every other year much good work was done on and off the field and while players and managers are often criticised when things don't go according to plan, i.e. you don't win, (nobody plans to lose!), the effort of the daily and weekly grind is just as great when you lose as when you win. We shouldn't forget that players and team officials put much of the lives on hold to give us something to cheer about and the main thing they ask, and deserve, from their supporters is... support... on both good days and bad.

With or without success at top level the good work of the club goes on. Another band of willing workers is those charged with preparing our teams of the future, with scores children from as young as four coached almost daily at our grounds. Another major initiative this year was the launch of Clontibret Our Future where up to 240 members have committed to a regular financial contribution of €20 per month over the coming years to help fund the development of our new grounds purchased in 2012. The fruits of this are already visible as the earthmoving equipment is currently busy at work levelling the new grounds.

These are exciting times for our club, time to develop new facilities for the next generation, time to develop young players and teams to use these facilities and time to lay plans to win back the Mick Duffy Cup, among others, in 2016.

Senior Championship and League

The defence of our championship title began as we would have wanted it, overcoming a strong Magheracloone challenge at Inniskeen on August 23rd with a 2-9 to 0-11 score line. Thereafter we entered a marathon duel with Ballybay which stretched over three matches including extra time and in hindsight probably defined our championship year. The first encounter in Blayney on Sept 5th ended 2-9 to 0-15, the replay in Scotstown on Sept 12th was a titanic struggle which also ended all square 1-15 to 2-12 while in the second replay in Inniskeen on Sept 19th we ground out a result 1-5 to 0-6 to advance to the semi final. Back in Scotstown on Oct 4th we got off to a good start against Monaghan Harps with a Conor Boyle goal and despite losing our way for much of the first half went in at the break only two points down. Starting the second half a man down put us on the back foot and despite valiant efforts from a number of players we failed to impose ourselves on the game and Harps were on their way to the final on a 2-12 to 1-10 score line. The team on duty was Conor Fadian, Brian Greenan, Colum Greenan (0-1)(C), Conor Boyle (1-0), Darach Mooney, Dessie Mone, David Savage, Eoin Greenan, Conor Lavelle, Martin Corey, Vincent Corey, Pauric Boyle, Aodh Curran, Ryan McGuigan(0-1), Conor McManus (0-8). Subs used Paul McGuigan, Kieran Greenan, Killian Lavelle, and Stephen Mohan while Rodney Gorman who had figured strongly in all previous championship matches was unavailable for that match.

Our senior league began in Ballybay on March 22nd where the locals came out on top, but as the year progressed we moved up the league table to a top four position as the last few rounds approached.

In the end it came down to a visit to Magheracloone following our championship exit where a team weaken by absences due to a wedding put in a spirited performance which wasn't enough to claim the points needed to ensure qualification as Magheracloone passed us out by one point.

Just like other years a lot of effort was put in by a lot of people both on the pitch and off it to ensure success this year, but for whatever reason it just didn't work out. A number of factors probably added to the mix including; the number of games we have to play without our county players; the fact that as soon as the county players are knocked out of the All Ireland series, they must readjust immediately and slot back into their team for the championship; the fact that the championship is run off so quickly at the end of the season and the difficulty of maintaining a winning momentum over consecutive years. The team was managed by Fergal Reel and I thank him and especially his local selectors Brendan Murphy and Damien Moen for their all their hard work with this team and the reserves as well as Colm Gormley and Aiden Woods who performed an important liaison role with the team.

Reserves

The reserve team started the league with a good win over Scotstown on March 15th and remained in contention for league honours until defeated in the last league game in Latton on July 17th by three points. The O'Duffy Cup campaign was short lived as we faced Monaghan harps in the preliminary round and lost out 1-6 to 0-11.

Minors

Our minor squad competed in Division One where the competition was strong and on completion of the first round we moved to the shield division. Convincing victories here against Scotstown and Harps brought us to a final clash with the Harps, where victory was the reward for this promising group of players under the guidance of Padraig McGuigan, Des Brennan and Brian McSkane. Team captain Gerry Gorman was presented with the newly commissioned McCartan Cup. Underage

Under the direction of Youth Officer, John Paul Mone, our underage structures continue, with the development of teams at all age levels from Under 6 to Under 16. The priority here is development and improvement to bring on as many young players as possible so that they too can wear the senior jersey with distinction in the not too distant future. JP has a more detailed Youth Report which is presented as an addendum.

County Players and Awards

Our players continue to backbone the senior county team and we are immensely proud of their contribution to the successes of recent years. None more so than this year when on July 19th in Clones a Clontibret man lifted the Anglo Celt Cup as captain for the first time ever as well as claiming the Man of the Match award. The outstanding contribution of Conor, Vinnie and Dessie to Monaghan's run in both league and championship was recognised when all three were honoured with Irish News Ulster All Star awards at year end with Conor also named as the Player of the Year at both the Irish News All Star Awards and the Ulster GAA Writers Awards. Conor Boyle is also steadily making a starting place on the team his own and would surely have done so this year but for a mid season injury. At Under 21 level, we were represented by Darren McDonnell, Conor Lavelle and Brian Greenan, while at county minor level Francis Hughes was selected. At Under 16 level we had

two representatives on the successful Buncrana Cup team in Jack Gormley and Conor Doyle, which, incidentally, was coached by our own Marty Corey

Further honour came to our club in November when Conor McManus was awarded with his second All Star and both Conor and Dessie were selected on the Ireland squad to face the might of Australia at Croke Park on November 21st.

Hurling, Camogie and Ladies Football

Hurling at adult level in the club is struggling to keep its momentum and while much good work is going on at underage only one underage team was affiliated this year. The camogie girls came up against a reenergised Blayney outfit this year and lost the final battles. The girls of O'Neill Shamrocks meanwhile carried the flag for the ladies winning their second ever county junior championship and were unlucky not to add an Ulster title, losing narrowly to the Derry champions. The demands of so many teams across all codes reinforce the need for additional playing and training facilities which will hopefully come on stream in the not too distant future in McCully's field.

Social Events

The highlight of the social year was of course was February 21st in The Hillgrove as we celebrated the successes of 2014, chief of which was winning back the senior championship, with The Mick Duffy Cup holding pride of place on a very crowded podium. Guests included the successful senior and reserve panels with their managers, Dom Corrigan, Olly Fay, Brendan Murphy and Mickey Hughes as well as Chairman of Coiste Chontae Mhuineachain CLG, Padraig Sherry, who addressed the large gathering.

Presentations were made to the successful managers; retiring officers Fergal Mone and Colm Gormley as well as to long serving grounds man Robert Kidney. Also recognised were players of the year at various levels including Young Player; Conor Lavelle, Reserve Player; Pauric Boyle and Senior Player; Colum Greenan. The camogie club also made presentations to their championship winning team and award winners.

Highlight of the evening was the contribution of Guest Speaker, 1993 All Ireland winner, Tony Scullion from Derry, who gave a heart-warming address aimed directly at the players as he challenged them to build on their past success and move on to greater things. Tony then presented the Reserve League medals to the players while Padraig Sherry presented the senior championship medals. Formal proceedings came to a close with a special presentation by Club Secretary Frank McManus to Colm Gormley with a photomontage to represent the achievements of the club in the senior championship during his thirteen-year Chairmanship. The celebrations continued into the night to music provided by Brendan McCourt and band

The clubhouse continues to provide a valuable social outlet and focal point for members with many enjoyable gatherings, both planned and impromptu during the year. I acknowledge the efforts of all who work towards making the Clubhouse a pleasant and relaxing environment and remind members that it is a facility there for all, to be used as much as possible. Thanks to Kevin Winters, bar staff, including volunteers who help when needed, those who provide refreshments during championship matches, as well as those who look after cleaning and maintenance

Clontibret Our Future

The announcement earlier in the year that a new sports capital programme would become available prompted thoughts of developing the grounds adjacent to our main pitch purchased three years ago. In order for such an application to be successful matching club funds would be needed and so was launched after much planning and deliberation the Clontibret Our Future fund This involves asking members and friends of the club to commit to a contribution of €20 per month (€240 per year) over the coming years to help complete the development. The initiative was driven largely by Club chairman, Aidan Deighan and a willing band of promoters who took on the unenviable task of contacting prospective contributors. To date almost 240 members have signed up creating a

potential fund of over €50,000 which together with the €55,000 granted through the Sports Capital Fund will allow Phase One of the development (stripping and levelling the site) to be completed, hopefully by year end. When that is completed we will then seek funding for Phase Two which will involve restoring the surface, drainage and the laying of an all weather pitch with associated facilities. We will of course be depending on the generosity of Clontibret Our Future contributors to continue into the coming years to bring the project to completion.

Development

While the most notable aspect of development began on October 30th when the machines moved in to strip and level the new pitch, the more mundane aspects of development continued throughout the year. Maintenance and management of both pitches and buildings continues year round with significant improvements carried out to ladies toilets and referees room.

O'Neill Park continued this year as the premier location for championship matches within the county and we hosted ten different championship days, six double headers and four single matches I wish to acknowledge the work of all who facilitate this, including our field staff and voluntary stewards whose work on match day in organising patrons and their parking is the principal reason for the popularity of our grounds. Workers at the grounds from both CES and Tus schemes this year included Pete Moen, Tom Mohan and Ciaran McMahon. Pete Moen has now been replaced by Chris Reidy, while Mick Hamill also made a vital contribution during a stand-in spell with us over the summer.

And finally

I thank all those who continue work away quietly in the background to ensure the smooth running of the club at different levels; in the clubrooms, at the grounds, washing jerseys, catering, acting as linesmen, umpires and scorekeepers, selling programmes and other necessary jobs that are often unseen but have to be done. Running a club that covers all codes, with multiple teams and hundreds of players and members, can be a complex and demanding operation, with demands and responses changing daily and sometimes more often. I thank all members of the executive committee, collectively, who contributed to that, including Chairman Aidan Deighan who began his tenure in January and Caroline McQuaid who looked after the treasury this year. Special thanks also to our many sponsors who provide much needed funding, especially main sponsor Woods Fuels. At this time of year when the club takes stock it is important that club officers also review their contribution and as club secretary since 1996 it is time that I so do. Having carefully considered the position, I will, if required, serve one more year, but it is time for a new generation to take over the administration of this great club and perhaps a new secretary could be groomed in during the coming year.

I offer deepest sympathy to all families who were bereaved, during the year, and advise that Mass will be offered for deceased members and friends of the club on Saturday 9th January 2016 at 7.30pm in St Mary's Church. We remember especially, at this time, the late Pat Brennan former player, team mentor, club officer, including Club President and willing supporter both vocally and financially, over many years, who passed away in January . I wish all who are unwell, a speedy return to good health, with best wishes to all, for Christmas and 2016.
